Minneapolis—Children's Theatre Company (CTC) is pleased to announce it has been awarded a \$40,000 grant by the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) through its Grants for Arts Projects program. This grant will support the upcoming world premiere of *Babble Lab*. In total, the NEA will award 958 Grants for Arts Projects awards totaling more than \$27.1 million that were announced as part of its first round of fiscal year 2024 grants.
