Over the 27-year visionary tenure of Artistic Director Peter C. Brosius, much has happened at CTC. The theatre has premiered world-class productions, introduced exceptional new programs, and achieved significant milestones. We are privileged to share the following timeline, exploring how CTC has evolved. nurtured young people, and contributed to the world of theatre during his tenure.



2013

ACT One, CTC's cohesive platform for access, justice, equity, diversity, and inclusion, is created.

The Mellon Foundation awards a five-year grant to five partner theatres—Latino Theater Company, Ma-Yi Theater Company, Native Voices, Penumbra, and Children's Theatre Company—to commission 16 new works by BIPOC artists: eight titles have been comissioned to date, including Drawing Lessons, set to have its world premiere

2003

A Year With Frog and Toad opens on Broadway, following an off-Broadway run and the 2002 world premiere at CTC. The show receives three Tony® Award nominations, and CTC receives the Tony® Award for Outstanding Regional Theatre.

Neighborhood Bridges is founded by Peter C. Brosius and Jack Zipes. This program uses storytelling and creative drama to help children develop their critical literacy skills and trasnform them into storytellers of their own lives.

### 2004

CTC receives the Children's Theatre Foundation of America Medallion of Honor and is named the top theatre for children in the United States by TIME magazine.

2005

CTC expands its physical space with a \$30 million construction project, adding the Cargill Stage, the McGuire Education Center, and new production shops.

CTC partners with Seattle Children's Theatre to create our licensing division, Plays for Young Audiences (now Plays for New Audiences).

## Investing in the Next Generation

Celebrating 20 years of focused programming for CTC's youngest theatre lovers

As the nation's largest multigenerational theatre, young people are at the heart of everything we do at CTC. We believe that theatre can be transformational for every person, at every age—and that no one should be left out because they still have growing left to do.

A hallmark of outgoing Artistic Director Peter C. Brosius' legacy, early childhood programming has been a cornerstone of CTC's work for 20 years. Dedicated programming began in earnest in 2004, starting with a series of theatre classes for preschoolers. In the following year, the theatre presented a world-class preschool play from Sweden on the then-brand-new Cargill Stage, which was built especially to serve our youngest audiences.

Thanks to support from a generous community of donors and partners, CTC officially launched our Early Childhood Initiative in 2007, which combines theatre arts-based learning experiences with best practices in early childhood education to support the healthy development of early learners ages 2-6. Using a comprehensive approach that blends age-appropriate learning opportunities and the magic of theatre, CTC's littlest theatre lovers are supported in their most critical development years and given tools that they will carry with them for a lifetime.

Today, early childhood programming, is thriving at CTC. Our youngest audience members and students enjoy dedicated classes, camps, educational residencies, and productions—all designed with their social-emotional learning, academic advancement, and best sense of fun in mind. Thank you for helping us to create the next generation of theatre lovers!





Since 2012, CTC has produced five preschool productions that were specifically created for audiences ages 2-5. All preschool productions are designed to be sensory friendly—soft lighting, lowered sound, and simple sets—so that our youngest audience members can enjoy the story without being overstimulated.

CTC's Early Bridges
curriculum is used
in lower-elementary
school residencies,
including in our flagship
partnership with Bethune
Arts Elementary. This
pedagogical approach
focuses on integrating
arts experiences with
ongoing educational
work, supporting
reading, critical thinking,
and public speaking.

CTC's Creative Play curriculum serves preschools and Kindergarten classrooms across the Twin Cities, offering lessons that focus on choice, mindfulness, emotional literacy, and sensory exploration. These skills are critical in developing self-awareness, emotional regulation, and confidence, and studies show that the early development of these skills have compounding benefits later in life.

Theatre Arts Training classes and camps begin accepting students at 2 years old. Over the last decade, nearly 3,000 preschoolaged students have started their theatre journeys in a CTC classroom.



**Production Spotlight:** Babble Lab

This spring's production of *Babble Lab* was the latest show in our preschool series. Developed, written, and performed by CTC Acting Company member Autumn Ness, *Babble Lab* tells the story of a scientist experimenting with sounds who accidentally invents the alphabet—leading to sneaky, spritely letters wreaking havoc in her laboratory! Wrapped in the guise of colorful projections and funny noises, this production is an explosion of language, and offers a one-of-a-kind entry into empowered communication.

"I created the show for preschool because they are in the thick of so much development. Learning how to express their feelings, learning words can hurt, or make people laugh, learning letters, it's such an incredible time. And I'd love for the little ones to leave the show with a playful feeling about expressing themselves, instead of the frustration we see so often with the very young."

# The Return of *A Year With Frog and Toad*


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"It's Spring"—and Frog and Toad are back on stage at Children's Theatre Company! Over the last 22 years, this beloved Tony® Award-nominated musical has been all over the world, enlivening the stages of small community theatres, large Broadway houses, and everywhere in between.

Originally created right here at CTC, A Year With Frog and Toad is a story about friendship, compassion, and purpose. For the first time since 2017, our stage is being transformed into the reedy landscape that is home to these two best friends—and the cast of eclectic characters that make up their community. Read on to learn more about this beloved production, and to hear directly from the two lead actors about what this story means to them.

### **A Little History**





- After the end of the premiere run at CTC, the entire show—sets, cast, director, stage manager, costumes, and props—all transferred to the New Victory Theatre. It was there that a special invitation was issued to Broadway producers to see the show and consider it for a run; the show ultimately opened and ran at the Cort Theatre (now known as the James Earl Jones Theatre).
- That same year, A Year With Frog and Toad was nominated for three Tony® Awards in 2003, including Best Musical, Best Book of a Musical, and Best Original Score.
- Since closing on Broadway, A Year With Frog and Toad has been one of rights holder Musical Theatre International's most requested shows and has been produced hundreds of times across the country and around the world.
- Finally, although it has been many years since this show first opened, this production will feature work from some familiar faces: Adrianne Lobel (scenic design), Daniel Pelzig (choreography), Martin Pakledinaz (costume design), James. F. Ingalls (lighting design), and Rob Milburn and Michael Bodeen (sound design) were all members of the original 2002 world premiere.
