Land Acknowledgment

Children's Theatre Company (CTC) acknowledges that the theatre was established on land that the Wahpekute Tribe of the Dakota nation still calls home. Around the year 1600, the Wahpekute were a wandering people who landed in Mni Sota Makoce (Land Where the Waters Reflect the Clouds—and the people's roots here remain strong). They are a part of the Dakota Seven Councils of Fire, which include the Mdewakanton (Dwellers by the Sacred Lake), Sisitonwan (People of the Marsh), Wahpetonwan (Dwellers Among the Leaves), Ihanktown (People of the End), Ihanktowana (People of the Little End), Tetonwan (People on the Plains), and Wahpekute (Shooters Among the Leaves).

Today, Minnesota is a vibrant and diverse state with the history and influence of the Dakota people woven throughout. We honor and respect the many Indigenous People still connected to this land. We acknowledge that we have benefitted from systems that have hoarded power and marginalized Indigenous Nations, communities of color, the LGBTQIAP+ community, people with disabilities, women, children, and all who meet at the intersections.

CTC acknowledges that we are now stewards of the land the Wahpekute People of the Dakota Nation were largely driven from. As storytellers, it is our duty to recognize that the narratives of this region have long been told from one dominant perspective without acknowledging those whose narratives began before. It is our responsibility to the Dakota Nation, our staff, our board, our audiences, and our artists to collectively honor their lives, amplify their voices, and reimagine our future.

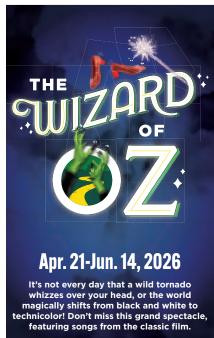

Discover More: Dr. Seuss's How the Grinch Stole Christmas!

3 Things to Know:



CTC's stage production still uses much of the original set from its world premiere at CTC in 1994.



In CTC's early productions of Dr. Seuss's How the Grinch Stole Christmas!, the actors would wear prosthetic noses to help create the look of the Whos, and each Who had a unique way of moving to help distance them from human. Max the dog also had a large dog nose which helped with the illusion, but made it difficult to perform and covered much of the actor's expressions.

Each remounting of the production features new ideas to create and explore the world, everything from new props to rope swings over the stage, climbable trees, The Grinch appearing atop the proscenium arch, bridges and staircases for added height and visuals, new music and songs, adjusted lines and text, different intentions for the characters and ways of accessing the story through this nuance, new costumes and, finally, new audiences who bring out current day sensibilities into the theatre as we sit down to hear a familiar story with fresh eyes and ears.

QSA with CTC Charge Artist Mary Novodvorsky



Mary Novodvorsky was part of the team that mounted the original 1994 production of *Dr. Seuss's How the Grinch Stole Christmas!*

What is your first memory of working on the original 1994 production?

It was huge and we all wondered how we'd get it finished and where we'd put everything after it was built. The second year it was onstage, a huge double-sided staircase was cut because there just wasn't room enough for the actors in their pod costumes backstage. The mountains are so tall and voluminous, even I couldn't reach parts of them to paint them and I'm 6 feet 3 inches tall. We had to rig a wooden plank with ropes to lift me up to paint some hard-to-reach places.

What sort of work goes into remounting the production with set pieces that have been in use for 31 years?

Twenty-plus years is a long time for scenery to last, especially when it is continually remounted. After many years of the show moving in and out of a warehouse and having to be trucked across town, things start to look a bit ragged. Some pieces are rotated out as we have the time and budget to build fresh new replacements. A lot of pieces just need some fresh paint. There are a lot of purples and pinks in the show, and those colors fade the most over time. About every third or fourth time on stage, some units get a complete repaint because they've faded too much.

The snow pieces and trees are built with a supporting structure and two-part insulation foam sprayed on to get the snow look. Over its lifespan, the foam degrades, gets weak, and breaks down. That foam must get replaced and the unit re-painted to match. Some of the foam also doesn't hold up because of the action involved in the show. Then we come in with a different two-part product to create a hard shell over the foam. That way, the actors can stand or walk on that foam and not risk breaking it down further.

Anything else you'd like to share?

Originally, the show wasn't meant to be kept, so it was not built to come apart and move to a warehouse. It was such a great show that we decided to keep it. That meant the foam had to be cut apart to truck it to the warehouse. Every year when it was remounted, we had to texture and hide where it was cut apart. About the eighth or ninth remount, I started to make the pieces modular with natural breaks that blended in with the other shapes. You might be able to figure out where the old cutting places are if you study the set.





What excites you about collaborating with Dean Holt and Reed Sigmund on *Dr. Seuss's How the Grinch Stole Christmas!*?

Dean Holt and Reed Sigmund are exceptionally talented and exceedingly experienced actors and theatre artists. Together they truly demonstrate the DNA that makes Children's Theatre Company the powerful and positive organization it is. I'm thrilled to work with them, and am definitely taking notes!

How does the choreography in this show propel the story forward? What does it reveal about the characters?

Director Dean Holt and I are working to make the choreography integrate deeply into the storytelling, so it can reveal relationships, express emotions, and allow audiences to be delighted and entertained while also feeling the tender heart of this story.

What (and who) are your biggest inspirations as a choreographer?

I have trained in many forms of dance beginning in my mother's basement dance studio. I have deep love and respect for jazz dance and jazz music gained in my years touring with Zoe Sealy and Danny Buraczeski. I've enjoyed physical acting styles and movement theatre work with companies like Combustible Company and Off-Leash Area. However, my 35-year career with Flying Foot Forum, a percussive dance theater company, has most deeply shaped my style and expanded my understanding of how the body can express itself in a fully dimensional way.

What do you love about the musical theatre and dance scene in the Twin Cities?

The musical theatre and dance scenes in the Twin Cities are so exciting and each have powerful and long-standing histories. I especially love when the concert dance and musical theatre worlds integrate in ways that expand both forms and you can feel their power multiply.

You are on the faculty at the St. Olaf College. What is your #1 piece of advice to dance students?

Over the past 40 years, I've really fallen in love with teaching. It's important to me to teach the history of the forms we work with, and to work with technical ideas that will keep dancers "dancing longer, and dancing stronger." I teach students that listening is at the heart of dancing. I hope my students learn that every body is a dancing body; that dancing puts you in constant conversation with your body, and that their dancer's heart and dancer's way of being in the world is their super power!

How do you choreograph dances for Whos?

I have been playing with the wonderful Who costumes and exploring the secrets of how the Whos can (and can't) move in them. Movement genres can have a relationship to a culture's physicality, the work they do, the climate they live in, and the values they hold, among other things. It's been fun to imagine what the "folk" dances of the Whos might look like. It's pretty fun to wag their tails, bobble their heads, and prance around in pointy shoes!

I make bread from scratch and send anonymous hate mail.

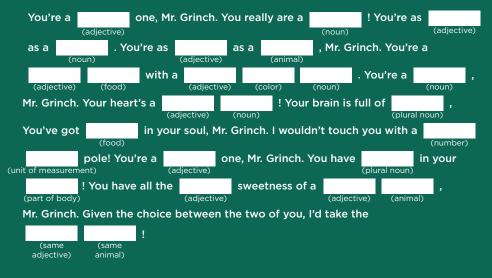
If you had to give a gift to the Whos instead of steal from them, what would you give them?

Rick is a graduate of Brown University, a member of the Stage Directors & Choreographers Society, and serves on the Board of Directors of Theatre for Young Audiences/USA.

Meet the Creative Team

Book and Lyrics

Timothy Mason's musical adaptation of Dr. Seuss's How the Grinch Stole Christmas! (music by Mel Marvin) has become a seasonal hit on Broadway and on tour. His plays have been produced in New York by Circle Rep (including *The Fiery Furnace* starring Julie Harris and Babylon Gardens with Marv-Louise Parker and Timothy Hutton). Other plays have been produced by the Actors Theatre of Louisville, South Coast Rep, Seattle Rep, Victory Gardens, Portland Stage, the Jungle Theater, and the Guthrie Theater Lab. Mason had a long collaboration with A.C.T's Young Conservatory, (Ascension Day, The Less Than Human Club, Time On Fire, Mullen's Allev and, in progress, My Life In The Silents). STAFF SPOTLIGHT:

Alli St. John

Casting Director and Associate Producer

CTC: What is your role at CTC?

ASJ: I am the casting director and associate producer for CTC! Before that, I was a teaching artist for TAT and assistant director for *Dr. Seuss's How the Grinch Stole Christmas!* (2022).

CTC: What does your job involve?

ASJ: As casting director, I create casting breakdowns for all of our shows and lead our auditions. I work with directors to make casting decisions and make sure that everyone has what they need to be successful in the audition room and are prepared to start rehearsal. I maintain our actor database, see other theatre productions around the Twin Cities, and maintain relationships with people we want to work with. As associate producer, I read a lot of plays that CTC might want to produce, I work with the Artistic team on season planning and thinking about long-term projects and goals, and make sure we are always serving our mission. I meet a lot of people, I help put together our creative teams (which means the designers and other artists who work with the director on making the play), and I write contracts for actors.

CTC: What is your favorite thing about your job?

ASJ: My favorite thing about being a casting director is being in the audition room and seeing so many wonderful artists. I like making them feel welcome, cheering them on, and answering their questions. I really enjoy the puzzle of casting and making suggestions of different ways to think about how to cast a show. My favorite part about being associate producer is reading lots of plays and thinking about what shows we might get to do in the future!

CTC: What do you love most about CTC?

ASJ: Not only do I love the work that CTC makes, but I love how much the people who work here care about their work and each other. Everyone is always working so hard and thinking so creatively about how we can make something really special for our audiences. Every show, there's something that astounds me and makes me say "WOW! How did they do that?!" The people who work at CTC are so kind and generous and I know that we all care about each other as humans more than just for the work we make. It takes a lot of people to make a theatre work, and I am so appreciative to everyone who has a part in making it happen.

CTC: How can someone prepare for a career like yours?

ASJ: Be curious, try new things, and follow your heart! I don't think there is any one path to a career like mine, but if you're curious, ask questions! Ask to read people's plays, ask to observe auditions or rehearsals, and always be kind. If you want to make theatre, don't wait for someone to invite you to do it—go make what you want! I went to college and graduate school for theatre, worked as a teaching artist for a long time, and am a director. I created a lot of those opportunities and experiences for myself so that I could say I have tried it and learned something from it. Above all, it's about your community! Theatre isn't a solo operation, so get involved in as many ways as you can, and remember that it's about connection and community.

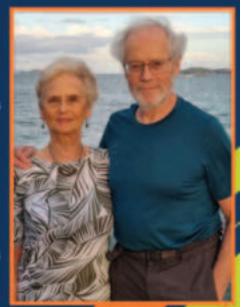

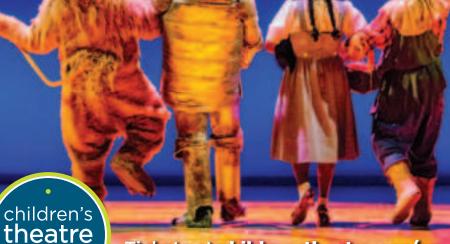
